COMMITTEE REPORT: The Sub-Committee on Standards

Committee Members: Ted Corbitt, Chairman, 150 W. 225 Street, Apt. 8H, Section 4, New York, NY 10463; (2) Dr. David Costill; (3) Ron Daws; (4) Dr. Tom Osler; (5) William Hargus; and (6) Dr. David A. Senechalle. Plus consultants: Aldo Scandurra, R. Carman, Buddy Edelen, and John C. Jewell (RRC of England).

The Standards Committee is charged with examining details of road course measurements and certifying courses found to be accurate; and with upgrading all standards related to running competition.

PROJECTS IN PROGRESS:

- 1. Setting up better timing procedures for long distance running.
- 2. Determining ways to cope with a growing air pollution problem.
- 3. Improving measurement data collection forms (questionnaires).
- 4. Comparison of the Calibrated Bicycle Method of Measuring with a Steel Tape Measurement over unpaved surfaces.

ROAD COURSE CERTIFICATION

The road course certification program has been in operation 10 years. In the continuing marathon "explosion", there are now 88 certified marathon courses in the USA. Eleven other marathon courses have a "provisional certification", and seven others have been measured but cannot be approved because of poor measurement techniques. During the first eight months of 1974, the Committee approved 33 course measurements. The Committee strongly urges that road race courses be measured with either the Senechalle Counter Assembly, or the Jones Counter Assembly, both of which are attached to a bicycle.

Measurement standards are continually being upgraded. Doctors Osler and Senechalle did yeoman service in helping evaluate road course measurements, with valuable assistance from Daws and Hargus. Mr. Alan Jones, Endwell, New York and Consultants Scandurra and Jewell were again very helpful to the Committee in its various activities.

The Committee again strongly urges that those who successfully bid for national AAU Championship runs, immediately inform their race sponsors back home of the rule requiring that championship runs be held on courses which have been certified by the Standards Committee. And those who are assigned to measure the course, should familiarize themselves with acceptable standards before measuring the road race course. The Committee can help in these matters.

The Committee has helped runners (officials) in Canada to inaugurate a road course certification program, using the same standards that we (and England) use.

The Committee recommends Pan Am Games Marathon Tryout qualifying times similar to those set for the 1972 Olympic Games team, i.e., 2:30 or better for a marathon run on a certified course.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIP COURSES: Through August, these Championship courses have been certified as accurate: Jr. 10 km X-Country; Senior, Junior and Masters 10 km; Senior and Masters 20 km; Senior and Masters 25 km; Senior and Masters 30 km, and 50 km Marathon and 50 Mile Runs.

NOT CERTIFIED TO DATE: Senior 3,000 meters, Freehold, N.J., and Masters, San Diego, Cal.; Senior 10 km X-Country, Pacific Assn.; Masters, Los Angeles; 5,000m X-Country, York, Pa.; 8,000m X-Country, Pacific Assn.; and Junior 20 km, Aurora, Colorado.
